BACKGROUND: Alcoholic Beverage Code sec. 106.14(a) states that the actions of an

employee, such as the sale of alcohol to a minor, are not attributable to the employer if the employer requires its employees to attend a seller training program approved by the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission (TABC). Subsec. (b) authorizes the TABC to approve seller training programs

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sponsored privately or by public community colleges.

DIGEST: SB 258 would authorize TABC to approve seller training programs

sponsored by public or private institutions of higher education that offer a four-year degree or certificate in hotel or motel, restaurant or travel or tourism management. The bill would take effect September 1, 1995.

SUPPORTERS

SAY:

Community colleges already offer the seller training programs, and fouryear institutions of higher education have expressed an interest in doing the same for their students who are employees of businesses serving alcoholic beverages. The omission of four-year higher education institutions from

this section was just an oversight that should be corrected.
