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fiscal 2004-05 would reduce funding for visiting judges substantially, it is unlikely that courts will be able to rely on using visiting judges as they have in the past.

- OPPONENTS HB 644 would cost the state more than \$129,000 per year in general revenue SAY: HB 644 would cost the state more than \$129,000 per year in general revenue that the state cannot afford to spend. If Johnson County needs help in reducing its dockets, it should rely on visiting judges paid for by money appropriated to the visiting judge fund.
- NOTES: The bill's fiscal note estimates that creating a new court in Johnson County would cost about \$129,000 per year in general revenue for the salary and benefits of a district judge.

The companion bill, SB 106 by Averitt, was considered in a public hearing by the Senate Jurisprudence Committee on April 9 and left pending.
