BACKGROUND: Government Code, sec. 441.157 establishes a grant-in-aid program to

assist local governments in records management programs or preserving

historically valuable local government records.

DIGEST: CSHB 2697 would repeal the current grant-in-aid program and establish a

new one. It would permit the Texas State Library and Archives

Commission to offer grants, subject to appropriations, to counties, other local governmental entities, and the state archives to preserve historically valuable records. The grants could be used for preservation, improvements to records management programs, or emergency disaster recovery. The

commission also could offer training and other support to local

governmental officials.

The bill would take effect September 1, 2005.

**SUPPORTERS** 

Texas counties collect and store documents that may be of significant SAY:

historical value to the state's history. However, the quality of the

preservation work, and whether it is done at all, varies widely by county.

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Historically, the existing grant-in-aid program has not been funded by the state, and local governments' documents are not uniformly protected from decay or destruction. The state needs to start over with a new grant program to preserve historical documents.

OPPONENTS SAY:

This bill is not needed because it would do what the existing statute does and there still is no funding for the grant program in either the House or Senate appropriations proposal for fiscal 2006-07.

NOTES:

The substitute remove d a fee in the filed version.

The fiscal note estimates that this bill would cost the state \$4.2 million in general revenue-related funds. These costs are associated with the need for staff to administer the new grant and training programs, as well as expenditures for historical document preservation and grant awards.
