SUBJECT: Creating a permit for dental hygienists to administer fluoride varnish

BACKGROUND: Dental hygienists assist dentists and may perform certain delegated duties

during a dental visit, including examining the patient's teeth, removing deposits and stains from teeth, taking x-rays, and teaching good oral hygiene. In Texas, dental hygienists' practice are governed by the State Board of Dental Examiners and their scope of practice is established in

Occupations Code, ch. 262.

Fluoride varnish is a topical application that has a higher concentration of fluoride than other gels, foams, rinses and pastes, but can be less toxic because a smaller amount of the product is swallowed during application.

DIGEST: SB 726 would amend Occupations Code, ch. 262, to permit dental

hygienists to administer without supervision fluoride varnish with a limited permit. The State Board of Dental Examiners would establish the

requirements to obtain a permit by November 1, 2005.

The bill would take effect September 1, 2005.

SUPPORTERS SB 726 would allow dental hygienists to administer fluoride varnish

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SAY: without supervision and under circumstances where a dentist may not be

present, such as free oral hygiene clinics. It would not permit dental hygienists to act as dentists in any way, and the public would be protected by the requirements established by the State Board of Dental Examiners.

OPPONENTS

SAY:

There are very few other circumstances when dental hygienists are permitted to work without supervision of a dentist, and all of them require follow-up by a dentist. Either SB 726 or the rules promulgated by the State Board of Dental Examiners to implement the permit should require

oversight by a dentist.

NOTES: The companion bill, HB 3003 by Zedler was left pending in the Public

Health Committee.
