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The bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds record vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take effect September 1, 2007.

NOTES: According to the Legislative Budget Board, HB 2217 would cost the state \$5.1 million in general revenue in fiscal 2008-09. The program would serve an estimated 80,000 students at 24 sites statewide. Each of the 24 sites would be funded with a \$100,000 grant. The program would require 1 additional FTE to administer and evaluate the grant program.

HB 2217 was withdrawn from the May 2 Local, Consent, and Resolutions Calendar and transferred to the Calendars Committee.
