SUPPORTERS SAY:	During winter, spring, or Thanksgiving breaks, most college students live at home while their dorm rooms are closed. Former foster care children do not have that luxury. Lacking a permanent home while their dorms are closed during break, many former foster care children are left homeless. Foreseeing this inevitability, many even choose not to go to college. CSHB 452 would require colleges to help certain students find temporary housing between academic terms. In most cases, this could be as simple as keeping one or two dorm rooms open or coordinating off campus housing with other students not living at home during these breaks.
OPPONENTS SAY:	Winter, spring, and Thanksgiving breaks typically are when colleges can reduce residency costs. CSHB 452 could force some colleges to keep their campus dorms open during breaks for a very small number of students.
NOTES:	The companion bill, SB 1705 by Lucio, was referred to the Senate Higher Education Committee on March 23.
