| BACKGROUND: | In 2011 the 82nd Legislature enacted SB 321 by Hegar to allow   |

employees to store firearms in their locked cars parked at their work place. The bill prevented employers from banning or punishing this storage. DIGEST: HB 1077 would prevent public and private institutions of higher education from adopting or enforcing rules prohibiting or placing restrictions on the storage or transportation of a firearm or ammunition in a locked, privately owned or leased motor vehicle by a person who lawfully possessed the firearm or ammunition on a street or driveway located on the campus of the institution or in a parking lot, parking garage, or other parking area located on campus. The bill would take effect on September 1, 2013. **SUPPORTERS** HB 1077 would allow students to store firearms in their locked cars on a SAY: university or college campus just as administrators, faculty, staff, and other employees of higher education institutions are able to do under current law. Many universities have adopted administrative policies that prohibit students from storing firearms in their cars. This can lead to students being disciplined, suspended, or expelled. However, many students commute to campuses daily or attend evening classes and want to be able to protect themselves during that drive. College students often drive long distances to and from home between semesters or on long weekends. They often transport their favorite rifle or shotgun with them so that they can hunt on weekends or during breaks. HB 1077 would reinforce students' basic right to self-defense. It is important to let law-abiding citizens have access to their firearms for selfdefense because laws alone do not stop criminals or the disturbed from committing violent crimes. The bill would not fill campuses with firearms. They would remain stored in locked cars. As such, they would not affect the learning or educational climate on campus. **OPPONENTS** By allowing more guns on campus, HB 1077 would make campuses less SAY: safe. Campus police and others have argued that an increase in guns leads to an increase in gun violence. Others worry that an increase in the number of lethal weapons on campus would detract from an environment designed to foster learning and academic debate. Additional guns reinforce a siege mentality and a generalized feeling that people are under assault. A gun owner or a passerby also could be endangered if a firearm discharged accidentally.
