provider in the state. Daycare provider information would have to be searchable by:

- the provider's address and ZIP code;
- whether the provider was licensed, listed, or registered;
- the provider's hours of operation;
- the setting of the daycare provider;
- the ages of children served by the provider;
- whether the provider participated in the Texas Workforce Commission's childcare subsidy program;
- the provider's Texas Rising Star Program rating;
- the provider's status as an Early Head Start or Head Start provider; and
- inspection report.

The website would provide resources for parents on early childhood education and development and be easily accessible by persons who speak a language other than English and persons and families of persons with a disability. It also would include an optional profile for each daycare provider that included a brief narrative about the provider, services available, and photographs.

The website would have to be available through a mobile application, and HHSC could contract with a third party to establish the website and application. HHSC would have to consult with the Texas Early Learning Council in developing the website and would have to make it available to the public by January 1, 2020.

The bill would take effect September 1, 2019.
