SUPPORTERS SAY:	CSHB 1981 would help expedite the return of some \$6 billion in unclaimed funds in the state. The bill would make it easier for individuals to recover these unclaimed funds, including utility deposits, oil and gas royalty payments, and other monies, by authorizing the comptroller of public accounts to allow a person with a limited power of attorney from the reported owner of unclaimed property or the owner's heirs to act on their behalf.	
	The bill's requirement that a limited power of attorney be attested and signed by two or more credible witnesses and that the witness signatures be notarized adds a layer of verification and fraud prevention to the recovery process.	
CRITICS SAY:	CSHB 1981 could open the door to allowing persons to claim and recover funds to which they were not entitled. While the bill as substituted adds a layer of verification by requiring persons to present a limited power of attorney document that is notarized and attested to by two witnesses, frau- still would be possible. Texas' unclaimed property division of the comptroller's office would have to spend resources to verify that documentation presented was valid.	
NOTES:	According to the Legislative Budget Board, the bill would have an estimated negative impact of about \$1.3 million to general revenue through fiscal 2023 and would add eight full-time equivalent state employees to administer the bill's provisions, with similar impact in subsequent biennia.
