BACKGROUND: Interested parties have suggested amending statute to prevent the

possibility of insurance policies or health benefit plans from

discriminating against businesses that have not required all employees to

be vaccinated.

DIGEST: HB 3028 would prohibit certain health benefit plans or other insurers that

provided insurance policies to business entities from requiring as a condition to purchase or maintain coverage that each of the business's

employees was vaccinated.

Applicability. The bill would apply only to certain health plans issued by

organizations specified in the bill, including:

• a plan issued by a health maintenance organization;

• a multiple employer welfare arrangement that held a certificate of authority;

• a small employer health plan subject to the Health Insurance

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Portability and Availability Act; and

• a consumer choice of benefits plan.

The bill also would apply to a life insurance company and an insurer offering a property and casualty insurance policy to a business entity.

The bill would take effect September 1, 2021, and would apply only to a health benefit plan or insurance policy issued or renewed on or after January 1, 2022.
