SUPPORTERS SAY:	HB 1846 would help to address the state's truck driver short ensuring that individuals with commercial learner's permits state could take the tests required for a commercial driver's Texas. The driver shortage has contributed to higher costs, of reduced productivity in transportation. Under current law, the	from out of license in lelays, and

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	conduct a skills test for an out-of-state student applying for a CDL in Texas, but is not required to do so. This means that many students have to travel back to the state that issued their learner's permit in order to be licensed, making it less likely that they will work and drive in Texas.
	While the change proposed by HB 1846 would require some upfront expenditure by the state, it is estimated that the number of CDL skills tests would be increased by 25%. Making it easier for more truck drivers to begin working in the state could enhance transportation capacity, lower costs, create jobs, and advance economic development in Texas.
CRITICS SAY:	No concerns identified.
NOTES:	According to the Legislative Budget Board, HB 1846 would have an estimated negative impact of about \$18 million to general revenue related funds through fiscal 2024-25.
