BACKGROUND: Some have suggested that creating an oyster advisory committee to advise

on the management of oysters in Texas would allow for such policy to be

better informed by the oyster industry.

DIGEST: CSHB 3385 would establish the Oyster Advisory Committee to advise the

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission (the commission), the Texas Parks

and Wildlife Department (TPWD), and the director of TPWD on the

management of oysters. The bill would specify that the committee would

be an advisory committee of the commission and subject to relevant

statutory provisions of such an advisory committee.

The bill would establish provisions relating to the public nomination of

committee members, frequency of committee meetings, and records of

meeting minutes and attendance. By October 1 of each year, the

committee would be required to submit a report to TPWD that included

recommendations for the management of oysters in the state and any other

useful and appropriate information.

The director of TPWD would be required to establish administrative procedures to carry out the bill's provisions, while the commission would be required to adopt any rules necessary for the relevant administration of the advisory committee by December 1, 2023.

By January 1, 2024, the presiding officer of the commission would have to appoint the initial members of the advisory committee, whose terms would expire January 1, 2026. Unless the committee was continued in existence of the applicable sunset review provisions, the committee would be abolished and the bill would expire September 1, 2027.

The bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds record vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take effect September 1, 2023.
