BACKGROUND: Some have suggested that expanding the definition of trafficking to

include the acts of soliciting and patronizing would remove the burden on

certain sex trafficking victims to identify their traffickers.

DIGEST: For the purpose of defining conduct related to the offense of trafficking of

persons, HB 844 would expand the definition of "traffic" to include

soliciting or patronizing another person by any means.

The bill would take effect September 1, 2023, and would apply only to an

offense committed on or after that date.
