BACKGROUND: Penal Code ch. 15 establishes the offenses of criminal attempt, criminal

conspiracy, criminal solicitation, and criminal solicitation of a minor, and

applicable penalties.

Health and Safety Code sec. 365.012 establishes offenses of illegal

dumping and discarding lighted materials, including a match, cigarette, or

cigar, and applicable penalties.

Some have suggested that providing local authorities the power to

prosecute individuals who order the disposal of unwanted materials could

help curb illegal dumping.

DIGEST: SB 1346 would establish that Penal Code ch. 15 applied to an offense

under Health and Safety Code sec. 365.012 related to illegal dumping and

discarding lighted materials.
