SUBJECT: Revising certain provisions on the licensing and regulation of dietitians

BACKGROUND: Some have suggested that current state law on dietitian certification

should be revised to align with national standards to reduce confusion

concerning certification requirements.

DIGEST: SB 2016 would replace current statutory provisions regarding the

qualifications for a dietitian license. The bill would require an applicant

for a dietitian license to provide satisfactory evidence to the Texas

Department of Licensing and Regulation that the applicant:

- was a registered dietitian or registered dietitian nutritionist;
- met relevant education and experience requirements, including possession of at least a master's degree conferred by an accredited and recognized college or university and completion of an accredited supervised experience or practice program in dietetics practice;
- passed an examination given by an applicable certifying entity;
- was in compliance with all professional, ethical, and disciplinary standards established by the certifying entity; and
- was not subject to any disciplinary action by the certifying entity.

The bill would repeal certain provisions regarding dietitians, including relevant definitions, the dietitian registry, licenses, examinations, and sanctions.

SB 2016 would apply only to an application for a dietitian license submitted on or after January 1, 2024. A person who held a dietitian license on the bill's effective date could continue to renew that license without complying with the bill's provisions. A person who was credentialed as a registered dietitian or registered dietitian nutritionist before January 1, 2024, and continued to hold that credential could apply for a dietitian license and would be exempt from complying with the bill's provisions.

The bill would take effect September 1, 2023.
