MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR

Mr. Edward Clark, secretary to the Governor, appeared at the bar of the House, and, being duly announced, presented the following message from

the Governor, which was read to the House, as follows:

Executive Office,

Austin, Texas, April 1, 1935.

To the House of Representatives of
the Forty-fourth Legislature:

I am returning herewith House Bill No. 569, which I have vetoed, for the following reasons:

1. This bill is in form a general law applicable to counties with not less than 22,296 and not more than 22,580 inhabitants. Therefore, it is, in effect, a local bill and, in my opinion, it is clearly unconstitutional. I am in receipt of an opinion from the First Assistant Attorney General holding this bill to be unconstitutional.

2. This bill attempts to authorize commissioners courts in any county falling within this narrow margin of population to purchase one truck, or "pick-up," for each commissioner's precinct in said county for the use of each county commissioner. I see no reason for granting this authority to one county in the State and not to others. This, however, is the effect of the bill.

I am, therefore, vetoing same, not only because, in my opinion, it is unconstitutional, but because I doubt its wisdom and policy.

CONSIDERATION OF VETO OF
HOUSE BILL NO. 569

Mr. Dunagan called up for consideration at this time,

H. B. No. 569, A bill to be entitled "An Act authorizing the commissioners court in the county or counties containing 22,296 and not more than 22,580 inhabitants, according to the last Federal Census, to purchase out of certain funds of the county, one truck or pick-up for each commissioner precinct, to be used in said precinct in the official duty of commissioner or commissioners, providing that said truck or pick-up shall not be used by commissioner, commissioners, or anyone else for personal business or pleasure trips, and declaring an emergency";

The bill having been received from the Governor today notifying the House of his veto of same.
